# **KEY MESSAGE**

### Why volunteer?

Volunteers continued to pour into the VolunteerConnector looking for new opportunities to connect with their neighbours. Top three reasons for volunteering as reported by volunteers include:

- Wanting to be connected to a larger cause and make an IMPACT.
- To meet to people a create new **CONNECTIONS**.
- To find a new or renewed sense of **BELONGING**.

### **Emerging Volunteerism**

Volunteer Demographics continue to shift from boomers to gen z. This generation, Z, is cause focused vs org focused, specifically causes of social and environmental justice. Formal volunteer programs that rely on an aging volunteer base that is stepping back are struggling to adapt.

### **Barriers To Volunteering**

We need to pay attention to issues like inflation. Affordability factors affect individual's ability to volunteer. This makes affordability a top barrier to volunteering where institutional barriers persist for marginalized people.

### **Volunteer Burnout**

Volunteers are crisis ready. We see immediate response every, single, time to the emerging crisis in communities across the country. This is admirable as humans seek to help their neighbors navigate difficult situations. Increase levels of volunteer burnout may be coming particularly in light of the continuing echo of the pandemic.

### **INFECTIOUS VOLUNTEER ENERGY**

"When I first signed up to volunteer at the Calgary Comic and Entertainment Expo back in 2007, I'll admit, I was skeptical. The thought of giving up my time for free made me question my decision. The experience was so much fun that I volunteered at the Expo for two more years. It wasn't about the event but the connections I built and the community I became a part of. I even ran into Brent Spiner wandering around by himself and saying hello to everyone! This newfound love for volunteering led me to other volunteer opportunities, including the Calgary Drop-In Centre."
